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# Background

Bangladesh is currently in a crucial phase of demographic transition.

The **July Movement**, started as a quota reform protest, has driven political, institutional and social reforms in Bangladesh—offering a key opportunity to gauge youth perceptions of the job market and these changes.





## **Objective**

This study intends to

- Examine the **status quo** of youth across the country.
- Evaluate how prepared young people feel for the current job market and identify the types of employment opportunities they are considering or pursuing.
- Identify gaps between youth education and training and the demands available employment opportunities.
- Explore youth perceptions of the direction, inclusiveness, and effectiveness of political, social, and institutional reforms following the July Movement.
- Identify priority areas for reform as expressed by youth, with attention to variations across gender, geographic location, and socio-economic background.
- Assess whether young people feel hopeful or disillusioned about the potential for meaningful change.





# Methodology & Approach

This study followed a **mixed-methods approach**, combining both **quantitative survey (conducted from May 20 to May 31, 2025)** and **qualitative interviews** to understand the diverse realities, experiences, and perspectives of young people across Bangladesh, with a follow-up survey planned after six months (October/November 2025).

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#### **Quantitative Survey**

- **Target group:** Youth aged **15–35 years** (National Youth Policy, 2017)
- Nationwide coverage:
  - 8 divisions, 2 districts per division, 2 upazilas per district
  - Covered both **rural and urban** areas
- Enumerator-based household survey
  - Households selected using random interval (every 5th household)
  - In-person data collection
  - **Consent** obtained for participation in the next round.

#### **Qualitative Component**

- **17 case studies** conducted in interview style
  - Capturing life stories, challenges, struggles, successes, ambitions, demands and opinions
  - Participants: entrepreneur, job holder freelancer, returnee migrant, unemployed youth, among others.
  - From all 8 Divisions
  - Minimum 2 case studies per division

# **Sampling Framework**

#### **Quantitative Sampling Criteria**

**Total respondents:** 2,000 youth

Age group: 15–35 years

**Rural-urban ratio:** ~50:50

**Gender ratio:** ~50:50

**Education level:** 40% below SSC, 60% SSC and above

**Religion:** Minimum 10% Non-Muslim representation

#### **Qualitative Sampling Criteria**

**Case study selection:** Diverse youth profiles based on region, occupation, challenges, and aspirations

"Freelancing is often not seen as a 'real' job in our country, even though industries like e-commerce, fcommerce, and digital marketing have been growing rapidly in recent years. # Main Difficulties in Getting Jobs

"I hold an M.A. degree but earn only 5,000 taka per month. Corruption in the job market and gender-based barriers have kept me from securing a job despite my qualifications. The lack of safety for women in the country at present also prevents many women from actively seeking jobs that match their qualifications. In such cases, entrepreneurship becomes a viable alternative, but the government must provide training and low-interest loans to support women." – *A young single mother (a school-teacher) from Nalitabari, Netrokona.* 

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"I hesitate to even buy the job application form because of the corruption that exists in the recruitment process." – *A 30-year-old gig-worker from Rajapur, Jhalakathi.* 

"Over the past 20 years, our education system has only declined, and vocational training remains largely inaccessible. To prepare the next generation, the government should integrate subjects like drone management, freelancing, and programming into the national curriculum." – *A 27-year-old SSC dropout who works in a poultry farm at Raozan, Chattogram*

### **Expectations for the Future**

I want the people of Thanchi to benefit, just like those living near the border in Thakurgaon, in Sylhet, or even in the slums of Dhaka and the upscale areas like Bashundhara. Voices from every class and every region should be heard before making any decision – *A 21-year-old undergraduate male student from Matiranga, Khagrachhari* 

I want to see a good governance-based political culture taking root in Bangladesh, where the administration and political leadership are accountable to the people. I believe that by strengthening technical education, creating more employment opportunities, and ensuring administrative transparency, we can build a truly self-reliant society – *A* 23 - *year-old male youth from Sunamganj* 

"The government should make education more rigorous instead of easier and update vocational training to be more practical and relevant. That way, people will be encouraged to explore diverse income opportunities beyond traditional jobs, which will help grow the economy and reduce unemployment – *A 22-year-old successful male student entrepreneur from Patgram, Lalmonirhat* 

Many colleges, especially under the National University, don't have proper equipment or qualified teachers. Without hands-on experience, students can't develop real skills. I also think unused government land could be turned into job-creating projects to help reduce unemployment – *A 22-year-old female student from Raninagar, Naogaon*
